The icon, created by Fabrizio Diomedi, honors martyrs over the centuries, but calls attention to recent suffering in the Middle East. It depicts the Blessed Mother with the Child Jesus over her heart, spreading her protective mantle around a representation of recent martyrs of Roman and Eastern Catholicism, including

those of Coptic, Armenian, Syriac and Orthodox traditions. The Knights of Columbus, through its Christian Refugee Relief fund, has distributed close to \$20 million to help needy families in the Middle East. #### St. Anthony Parish

Have you been to Mexico City and visited the impressive complex and one of Mexico's holiest places? This is where the Virgin of Guadalupe appeared to a humble Indian named Juan Diego in 1531. On Feb. 13, 16 parishioners from St. Anthony joined the Hawaii-Guadalupe pilgrimage group led by La Salette pastor Father Arnel **Soriano** and 15 pilgrims from other parishes for this once in a lifetime experience of faith, hope and love at the shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe. Despite the scare of the coronavirus that had just started in China, the group left with faith in their hearts that our Lord and our Lady would be with them to venerate the cloak (tilma) containing the sacred image of the Virgin in the new Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe. The tilma is 488 years old and still intact. The image appeared on the cloak of Juan Diego when he went to show the bishop that Our Virgin Mary told him to gather roses at Tepeyac Hill, even though it was winter, because the bishop wanted proof that he really talked to Our Lady. That's when the bishop believed him. The new basilica, completed in 1974, holds 10,000 people. The image is way up at the back of the altar but you can come closer and take pictures from a moving walkway below. The group had Mass at the basilica on Feb. 14, Valentine's Day. We also visited the old basilica on Tepeyac Hill where a church that Our Lady wanted is located. Last Dec. 12, more than nine million attended the feast day of Our Lady of Guadalupe. For the remaining four days, our group visited other churches including Our Lady of Ocotlan, where an apparition to another Juan Diego in 1541 was miraculously burned into the trunk of an oak tree. The group took home lots of bottles of the healing water. Thanks to Mama Mary of Guadalupe. (Reported by Fe Rodillas)
