On the International Day of Peace, Sept. 21, our parish and school dedicated our eight-foot tall hollow aluminum Peace Pole inscribed with "May Peace Prevail on Earth," in eight languages. Pastor Father Anthony Rapozo read Bishop Larry Silva's peace prayer, Father William Tulua spoke about the importance of the Peace Pole on the campus, principal MaryAnn Bode read Mayor Derek Kawakami's peace prayer, former Mayor Bernard Carvalho talked about the meaning of aloha with regards to peace, four eighth grade students helped with the unveiling and blessing, and Terri Mansfield gave a brief history of the Peace Pole. After the blessing, we inserted in the pole more than 1,300 peace prayers, contributed by students, staff, parishioners, the community, and Carol Aki and family. Peace Poles are handcrafted global symbols for peace meant to be a constant reminder for us to "Be Peace." There are more than 200,000 Peace Poles in over 180 countries. Notable locations include the Pentagon; the North Pole; the Giza pyramids in Egypt; Findhorn, Scotland; the Jordan River, Israel; The Hague, Netherlands; Confucius' burial site in Taiwan; Gorky Park, Moscow, Russia; Robben Island, South Africa; the Atomic Bomb Dome, Hiroshima; the OPEC headquarters; WTO and IMF world headquarters and the Cathedral Basilica of Our Lady of Peace in Honolulu.
