The following are excerpts from a letter to the school ohana by principal Tim Los Banos. "We have but a few weeks remaining in the Hooilo, or traditional rainy season of the Hawaiian calendar, and the summer will soon be upon us. Governor Joshua Green, M.D., recently proclaimed April as Native Hawaiian Plant Month and this underscores the breadth of Saint Louis School's efforts in sustaining and promoting aina-based learning. In fact, ongoing efforts of our Coordinator for Organic Sustainability, Jon Watase '07 and our students can be seen literally springing forth on campus. So, thinking back to our kupuna's environment makes us realize the value of planting dryland natives over thirsty alien species that we find in many garden shops. One of the tried-and tested hardy natives is the pohinahina, a silvery-leaf shrub that we see trailing over the redwood fence of the Wiegand robotics and engineering building just across from Newell Hall. Another dryland native is the official state flower, or mao hauhele, or endemic yellow hibiscus that we have on the terraced slope at the back of Bertram Hall. In front of Bertram Hall, flanking the walkway where Our Lady of the Pillar stands, are the Nihoa variety of the endemic loulu palm, and just next to them are two fledgling ohia, the treasured tree sacred to Pele and now threatened by disease in its native Hawaii island habitat. These are a sampling of the native plants on campus, and we have more in the nursery, awaiting transplanting into the Kalaepohaku substrate." (Reported by Tim Los Banos)
