1 EWA BEACH

Our Lady of Perpetual Help Parish

Laverne Suster, co-chair of our Food Pantry Ministry, released its report for the year 2024 as follows: The "Ask and You Shall Receive" table at our monthly distribution was established to provide non-food items such as clothing, baby equipment, supplies, diapers, cooking utensils, dishwashing liquid, laundry detergent, humidifiers, toys, hygiene supplies, etc. We received a grant for a new industrial refrigerator. OLPH passed the annual inspection by Hawaii Food Bank in September. Many volunteers aided in the turn-over to the new **Neighbor Connector Online System**, organizations that contributed food and goods from their own drives to OLPH Food Pantry, including Kaimiloa Elementary School, Hawaii Technology Academy, Ewa Beach Little League, Ewa Beach Lions Club, James Campbell High School and the United States Marines. On average, the parish Food Pantry serves over 600 people every month, about 360-plus households. The numbers are expanding. We have been distributing to more than 125 new households in the past two months. Our Food Pantry distributed well over 50 tons of food in 2024 from the Hawaii Food Bank. Donations from parishioners almost doubled the number. Surprisingly, the No. 1 non-food item requested has been diapers. Our monthly distribution is well supported by the **OLPH Knights** of Columbus, volunteers and parish staff. Our present church was built in September 1968 and blessed by Bishop John J. Scanlan. Other diocesan pastors include Msgr. Raymond Nishigaya, Msgr. Alan Nagai, Father Khanh Pham-Nguyen, Father Mario Raquepo and our current pastor Father Adondee Arellano. The theme for this celebration was "A Taste of Saint Stephen's." Mass at 10 a.m. was followed by fellowship in the parish hall. Nine ethnic groups prepared five dishes at their tables. Everyone went table to table to taste

Before the Mass, an introduction written by our pastor Father Samuel Loterte was read and reenacted by parishioners. Jubilee comes from the Hebrew word "yobel" which means goat horn. The Hebrews used the yobel to announce the beginning of the Jubilee Year to conduct spiritual reset as written in Leviticus 25:12, "For it is Jubilee, it shall be holy to you."The word hope in the Old Testament is "tikvah" which is translated as a rope or cord. It is a feeling of being connected to a good future. It also means patient waiting. In the New Testament, the word for hope is "elpis." It can be used to describe a confident expectation of the future. The symbol for Christian hope is the anchor. Our unwavering faith in Christ is an anchor that keeps a ship secure in stormy seas, representing stability and safety amid life's challenges. Two weeks prior to the event, catechists Ceraida Amar, Leah Pitoy and Joyce Padamada explained to the religious education students and other youths about the jubilee year. They learned that they too are pilgrims of hope and that the Jubilee is commemorated every 25 years. The children created Jubilee Year banners. The celebration began with the blessing of candles. A yobel announcing the opening of the celebration was played by **Tai Hess** using a euphonium instead of a goat horn. Joel Foronda and Nathan Mattos processed to the altar carrying a big cross attached to a rope (tikvah) followed by the religious education students wearing their ethnic costumes holding their banners and holding onto the rope. The anchor at the end of the rope was carried by Leah Pitoy. Other parishioners with costumes followed holding lighted candles in a newly carved bamboo

We pray that Immaculate Conception parishioners, including the many children in parish religious education, will participate in the "Silver Rose" service. Here is a brief history of the Knights of Columbus "Silver Rose." In 1960, to honor the blessing of Our Lady of Guadalupe on the Mexican people, the Columbian Squires, a youth organization of the Knights, wanted to give something back to her. The group of young men in **Knights of Columbus** Council 2312 in Monterrey, Mexico, came up with the idea of running a rose to the Basilica of Our Ladv of Guadalupe in Monterrey, Mexico. The rose was chosen to commemorate Juan Diego and the miracle of the roses, an important part of the story of Our Lady of Guadalupe. The first rose was a natural rose blessed by Bishop John C. Cody of London, flown to New York and taken by Supreme Knight Luke E. Hart to Dallas, Texas. After a few more stops it was given to the Squires from Monterrey, Mexico, at the International Bridge in Laredo. They ran the rose from the International Bridge to the basilica in Mexico, on Dec. 12, 1960. The story lives on with a silver rose. After the March 9 service in Ewa, we hope and pray that the catechists will tell the story of the "Silver Rose" to their students, that it was started by children their age and that, no matter how old you are, if you love the Lord, anything can happen.
